also, I like math and then I feel

I took microeconomics,

Micro micro micro micro? Uh, yeah.

00:09:13.860 --> 00:09:16.800 I guess, in a professional sense. So, let's kind of like start off

00:09:16.800 --> 00:09:18.660

a little bit with why you're here today.

00:09:19.170 --> 00:09:22.790

Uh, an interesting thing that you told me when we had a coffee the

00:09:22.790 --> 00:09:27.350 other day was that even before you actually became a student,

00:09:27.350 --> 00:09:30.320 you became involved with an institution of the university.

00:09:30.350 --> 00:09:33.050 So, what is that institution, so to say? [Venla]

00:09:33.200 --> 00:09:36.770 Uh, the student union of University of Jyväskylä.

[Irfan] So now I'm super curious.
How did you even get involved

with the student union before you became a student?

[Venla] I don't think I was, like, involved, but. Like.

Where I was, where I was just like, I knew a lot of people that was

in like the student council or the board of the JYY.

So, I really knew the student union very well before I was

00:09:58.320 --> 00:10:00.720

even a student.

What is like maybe a little bit

00:10:00.720 --> 00:10:03.210

strange.

Not many people do that,

00:10:03.330 --> 00:10:08.250

but I did like know it before, and I kind of also knew before I was

00:10:08.250 --> 00:10:11.890
a student that I would want to
get involved in the student union,

00:10:11.890 --> 00:10:15.850 and I wanted to get on the board and do the council stuff. [Irfan]

And we do the advocacy work for students in the university level,

city level, many different levels.

And we take care of the students

and make sure they have their rights.

And the student life is the best

that they can have. [Irfan]
So, kind of fitting for a city that

00:11:01.240 --> 00:11:03.820 has, I think, one of the highest densities of students in Finland,

00:11:11.920 --> 00:11:16.750 little bit of like a rough rundown? So, it's basically mandated by law,

00:11:16.750 --> 00:11:19.240 but what is the history of it? Do you have any idea like when was

00:11:19.240 --> 00:11:22.110 this one even founded? [Venla] Uh, this.

00:11:22.110 --> 00:11:26.190

The student union of Jyväskylä is like celebrating 90th years birthday.

So, we are very old.

It's a very old student union,

00:11:28.920 --> 00:11:32.190

but the oldest one,

I think the student Union of

00:11:32.610 --> 00:11:39.090

University of Helsinki is the oldest.

Uh, it's very old. Uh, yeah.

00:11:39.090 --> 00:11:42.810

I don't really... Can't go that much

the history I don't really remember

00:11:42.810 --> 00:11:47.170

in this setting, but it's all done.

We have done the student union

00:11:47.170 --> 00:11:51.640

movement, have done a lot.

We have like founded YTHS.

00:11:51.640 --> 00:11:55.660

It's like it's part of the work the student union has completed

00:11:55.660 --> 00:12:00.280 completion and other stuff, but it's like very long history.

00:12:00.280 --> 00:12:02.320
[Irfan] I actually didn't know that that like the student unions were

00:12:02.320 --> 00:12:04.660 involved with like kind of the creation of YTHS. [Venla] Yeah.

00:12:05.170 --> 00:12:07.240
[Irfan] Can you just give like, just for people who don't know,

00:12:07.240 --> 00:12:11.240 like what is YTHS? [Venla]

It's like the health care system

00:12:11.240 --> 00:12:15.110 for students, like they, like students don't have to go to the

00:12:15.110 --> 00:12:19.100

city health care they can go to

YTHS: heir own health...

00:12:19.550 --> 00:12:24.800

Health care? [Irfan] Yeah. Health care system.

Oh, I got to say, YTHS was one of the

00:12:24.800 --> 00:12:27.560

nicest surprises that I've ever

seen when I became a student here.

It's, like, super convenient,

super nice, and, you know,

00:12:30.590 --> 00:12:35.140

incredibly affordable. [Venla] Yeah.

[Irfan] Um, so in what way is the

00:12:35.140 --> 00:12:38.050

student union organized?

Every institution has a structure.

00:12:38.050 --> 00:12:39.730

What is the structure of the

student union?

00:12:39.850 --> 00:12:44.410

[Venla] So, we have a board where I'm sitting that we have ten person there.

00:12:44.410 --> 00:12:47.950

Then we have the student council.

That is like the highest power

00:12:47.950 --> 00:12:51.790

in the student union.

We have 41, uh, members in there,

00:12:51.790 --> 00:12:56.350

different groups, and they make

the most like the final decisions.

00:12:56.350 --> 00:12:58.760

Then we have the board,

we have ten people there and we're

00:12:58.760 --> 00:13:03.080

working like every single day.

Then we have also seven people

00:13:03.080 --> 00:13:05.030

working,

like we have specialists that work

00:13:05.030 --> 00:13:09.290

in every day in the student union.

And then we have also like Soihtu,

00:13:09.320 --> 00:13:12.680

the student apartments.

Then we also have people working

00:13:12.680 --> 00:13:17.240

there and also the student council

makes decisions to Soihtu also.

00:13:17.510 --> 00:13:20.450

[Irfan] So how often do all of you guys meet?

How often does the board meet?

00:13:20.480 --> 00:13:22.530

How often does the student

council meet? [Venla]

00:13:22.890 --> 00:13:27.630

Uh, the student council meets

every month. Oh, and the student...

00:13:27.630 --> 00:13:31.110

The board meets every week.

We are meeting every single week.

[Irfan] Sounds like a fun time. [Venla] Yeah. It is. [Irfan] So, about the student council.

Uh, do you have... Do you know of any decision that they've recently

00:13:39.300 --> 00:13:42.150

made that you can kind of highlight or something that you

00:13:42.150 --> 00:13:44.550

think might be interesting that

the student council has done?

[Venla] Um, we did update our policy paper that student council,

00:13:49.430 --> 00:13:54.230

like, decide. Uh, I don't know.

It's like a fun thing, but we like,

00:13:54.230 --> 00:13:58.910

uh, decide to end our event:

Jyrock. That goes all through

00:13:59.090 --> 00:14:02.870

the student council. It is not maybe the funnest thing to do,

00:14:03.140 --> 00:14:07.130 but they do decide a lot of, like, everyday stuff also.

00:14:07.910 --> 00:14:10.400
[Irfan] I guess sometimes you gotta make those difficult decisions and so.

00:14:10.410 --> 00:14:15.300 yeah, and balance out the funding. So how can somebody become a

00:14:15.300 --> 00:14:19.110 member of the student council? [Venla] Uh, we have elections every two years.

00:14:19.110 --> 00:14:22.890 This year we don't have election, but 25. Fall.

00:14:22.890 --> 00:14:25.710 We have a next election and you can run.

00:14:25.710 --> 00:14:30.660

You can go be a part of one of the groups and it's an election.

00:14:30.660 --> 00:14:35.210

It's like every normal election: you go run and then people can vote,

00:14:35.210 --> 00:14:38.180 and then you need a certain amount of votes to be in.

00:14:38.480 --> 00:14:40.430 [Irfan] So can international students also run? [Venla] Yeah.

00:14:40.430 --> 00:14:43.880

If you're a member of the student union, you can run and

00:14:43.880 --> 00:14:49.280 you can elect, like vote. [Irfan] Okay. So, besides the ability to run and

00:14:49.280 --> 00:14:52.970

I guess vote, uh, and we're going to get back a little bit to the,

00:14:52.970 --> 00:14:55.430

the voting later.

What's another reason why

00:14:55.460 --> 00:14:58.070 somebody would want to even be part of the student union?

Why would somebody want to be a member?

[Venla] Um, a degree student is a member like you can't choose

00:15:05.730 --> 00:15:07.830 are you a member or not, but student union...

Our university is part of

FORTHEM alliance.

So, I'm there in like work groups, uh,

00:21:50.930 --> 00:21:54.950

representing the student union and the student in the alliance.

Like we do same kind of work with what we do in the university.

And we try to make the student voice heard there.

this international student voice is not that heard and not seen.

So, I hope that...

I was like very interested.

We need to get the international voice heard more.

So, I was I have like very like

interest to do something there like

purpose like job that has purpose.

And I feel like that sector I can do

things that actually matters. [Irfan] Okay.

And the things that are actually

meaningful. [Venla] Yes. [Irfan]

So is there anything that you've

00:24:08.730 --> 00:24:12.180 representative? [Venla]

what international students think

00:24:18.560 --> 00:24:23.570 So, I created the survey to international students to tell

And we got a very nice response.

00:24:27.830 --> 00:24:34.430 We got a lot of answers there and a lot of like, like my eyes

was opened more and uh, so that's been accomplished.

What I have done this year and in the fall, we're going to continue,

like using those data and bringing the tables that can,

00:24:47.370 --> 00:24:50.880

like, change things and need to be that need to be heard

what the international students have to say,

00:24:53.190 --> 00:24:56.100

[Irfan] Oh, is there anything concrete that you've learned based on

00:24:56.100 --> 00:24:59.790

that data that you would like to use to implement something?

use to implement something.

[Venla] Uh, one of the big one is that we asked, what, uh, do the international

00:25:05.320 --> 00:25:07.780 student wants to stay in Jyväskylä after they graduate,

00:25:07.870 --> 00:25:11.920 like, almost like over 60% say that they wants to stay here.

00:25:11.920 --> 00:25:15.790 But then we ask how they see their work opportunities here.

00:25:16.180 --> 00:25:20.620 And over 60% say they don't see it very well. It's not good.

00:25:20.740 --> 00:25:24.610 So that is like big things we have to do to make better.

00:25:24.610 --> 00:25:29.160

Like there's... People wants to say
we have so much, like, people that

00:25:29.160 --> 00:25:33.090

they have, that they study here.

There's so much things that they

00:25:33.090 --> 00:25:39.390 can do, and we have to use it and see the city have a problem

00:25:39.390 --> 00:25:42.030 that people are leaving, but many people want to stay.

00:25:42.030 --> 00:25:47.100 So just like, what is called... [Irfan] Like there's this disbalance. [Venla]

Yeah, that's what we have to balance.

And city have to do more so that

International student can stay
here and have the opportunity to

[Irfan] Okay. Um, but I was kind of wondering.

It's kind of interesting.

I can see this parallel, you know,

00:27:10.700 --> 00:27:13.160

to why you're studying economics.

As you said, you have that

00:27:13.160 --> 00:27:16.460

multidisciplinary viewpoint.

You want to get some information,

00:27:16.460 --> 00:27:19.400

process the data, try to make a

decision based on that data,

00:27:19.400 --> 00:27:22.790

and then propose a policy.

So, it looks like you're quite

00:27:22.790 --> 00:27:25.940

literally living your own

studies in a practical sense.

If you don't have a thesis topic,

this might be like a potential

thesis topic.

But beyond international affairs,

we go do like basics,

everyday decisions there.

Uh, we do a lot of, uh,

paper updating, rules updating.

00:28:02.540 --> 00:28:07.910

We are like going different events and meetings.

00:28:07.910 --> 00:28:14.540

We meet the city, we meet the rectors and just going every places and

00:28:14.540 --> 00:28:17.850 telling what the student thinks.

[Irfan] So does that kind of mean, like,

00:28:17.850 --> 00:28:21.000 you know, let's say, I mean, I am a student, I have an issue,

00:28:21.000 --> 00:28:23.130 I have a suggestion.

Can I just walk to one of the

00:28:23.130 --> 00:28:26.580 board members who's responsible for a particular, you know, thing

00:28:26.580 --> 00:28:30.900 and knock on their desk and say,

Mr. or Mrs. or whatever, blah, blah.

00:28:30.900 --> 00:28:32.580

I think this should be done differently:

00:28:32.580 --> 00:28:37.530

Can you relay the message?

[Venla] Yeah. [Irfan] Just ideally I should not...

00:28:37.860 --> 00:28:41.960

[Venla] I think we don't really have our own table. So, I do recommend emailing.

Maybe emailing is probably the best way to contact, but yeah, like we all

Uh, there's international affairs, there

00:29:08.790 --> 00:29:13.320 of course, is the chair of the board.

Then we have the vice-chair also

00:29:13.320 --> 00:29:16.320 is like business side working close to Soihtu.

00:29:16.950 --> 00:29:23.430 Uh, then we had academic affairs, social policy, uh, communication,

00:29:23.430 --> 00:29:29.290 culture and events.
Uh, then we have multi... Like city...

00:29:29.470 --> 00:29:34.450

I don't remember the word in English but more close to like city, through a

00:29:34.450 --> 00:29:40.930

city policy and then association and tutoring. [Irfan] Okay I guess that's ten.

00:29:41.410 --> 00:29:44.530

[Venla] Yes, if I count, you're right.

[Irfan] I lost the count halfway through.

00:29:44.530 --> 00:29:48.820

I got, I got thinking about, like. [Venla] And, International affairs, of course. [Irfan] Oh.

00:29:49.270 --> 00:29:52.540

I think you got that one twice,

but I... [Venla] It's the most important.

[Irfan] I am biased towards it as well.

So we can say it

But you kind... You already kind of

mentioned Soihtu

a couple of times.

Yeah. Um, what is Soihtu?

[Venla] Soihtu s like, uh,

00:30:05.070 --> 00:30:10.920

the student apartment that

does, uh, the student apartments and

00:30:10.920 --> 00:30:13.650

is part of the student union.

The student union owns that.

00:30:13.830 --> 00:30:17.130

[Irfan] So they are the lovely people that

make it possible for people to

00:30:17.140 --> 00:30:20.080

actually live in affordable housing

is what you're telling me. [Venla] Yes.

00:30:20.110 --> 00:30:23.830

[Irfan] So how much involvement do you guys

from the board have with that,

00:30:23.830 --> 00:30:25.990

or is that more like student

council or do they have like

00:30:25.990 --> 00:30:29.830

their own separate thing? [Venla] Uh, if there's like usually we

00:30:29.830 --> 00:30:33.580 do like first decision that we make decisions about Soihtu.

00:30:33.580 --> 00:30:36.970 So that doesn't go to the student council if not that big.

00:30:37.000 --> 00:30:41.410 Um, but then we also if there's a decision we make our like, oh, we

00:30:41.410 --> 00:30:44.490 think this is the best thing to do.

And then it goes to the student

But we do most like the most important decisions about Soihtu.

village and I'm in one of the newer

00:31:22.090 --> 00:31:24.280 impressed by how quickly they're constructing that building.
