We aim to advance the **theoretical**, **empirical** and **practical** basis of L2 assessment for learning by bringing together dynamic and diagnostic assessment approaches

Thus, we address

- (1) lack of systematicity and basis in theory of learning / development in the assessment of L2 skills
- (2) lack of individualisation due to large groups and limited teacher time

We focus on reading and writing in English as a foreign language in upper secondary schools in Finland (16-18 -year-olds)

Dynamic Assessment (DA): Diagnosis through intervention



DA based in Vygotsky's (2012) **Sociocultural psychology**: new cognitive abilities, including language, appear first on *inter-mental plane* (dialogic interaction) & later on *intra-mental plane* (internal, use of language as inner speech)

- Full diagnosis of abilities includes emergent abilities
- **Mediation** [intervening in cognitive processes] through interaction (hints, leading questions, feedback, model, example)
- Process may lead to 'ripening' of abilities, promotion of development (Vygotsky,
 2011

Purpose: not for learners to 'do better' on test, but to diagnose development; <u>quality</u> of <u>mediation</u> learner requires + <u>responsiveness</u> to it





Focus on developing reading in English

- 1) with mediation and
- 2) with Al-based chatbot (additional instruction AFTER learner works through mediation, completes item; learning opportunity)

I Standardised mediation: reading for specific details



Look at the key parts of the question and the options. Think about what the question is asking. Then try to find this information in the text, thinking about how you search for it.

Once you think you found the place with the details you need, **look around this part** and think about the **meanings of words and phrases** you see. Try to connect them to the

question and the options. Remember that the details in the text are often said in a different

2 way than in the question.

You can also look for:

- The order of details, paying attention to verb tenses and words like first and then.
- How these details are connected, like comparing using likewise, or contrasting using but.
- Sometimes you need to choose the details that best match the question and the option.
- You can also use your knowledge about the topic to find the answer.

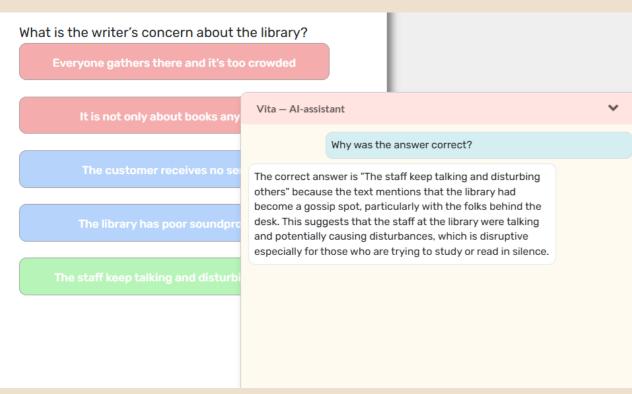

Participants and data



- The piloting data: 5 students in one upper-secondary school
 - Learner profiles
 - Group interview
- Upper secondary school students of English in 7 upper-secondary schools in Finland (n = 280, at the end of October)
 - Of them, 131 engaged with the chatbot at least once
 - Learner profiles including reflections on the immediate experience with mediation and chatbot
 - Classroom observations

Research question

why was the library being crowded not the right answer?	The text does not mention anything about the library being too crowded. Instead, it specifically mentions that the library has become a gossip spot, particularly due to the staff behind the desk. This is why the correct answer is that the staff keep talking and disturbing others. It's important to carefully read the text and base your answers on the information provided in the text.

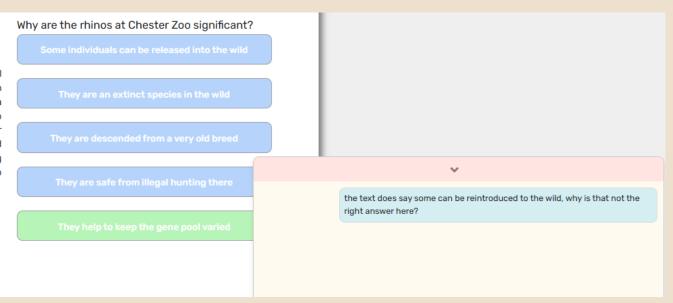

Student's query Chatbot's response the text does say some can be reintroduced While the text does mention that some to the wild, why is that not the right answer rhinos can be reintroduced to the wild, the here? main significance of the rhinos at Chester Zoo, as stated in the text, is their role in conservation breeding programmes. These programmes are critical in ensuring a sustainable population and maintaining the genetic diversity of the wild population. So, while reintroduction to the wild is a part of the process, the primary significance of the rhinos at the zoo is their contribution to keeping the gene pool varied.

S112: reflection on the chatbot interaction



R112: I think the chatbot was really good because I was able to ask why this answer wasn't right. And I think that in those reading comprehension tasks, I always give an answer, and then it's wrong, and then I think that I still don't understand why my answer was wrong...

T: And you received a proper response from it?

S112: Yes, I got a proper answer. I thought it was really well formulated that way, too...

R: Why exactly that question?

S112: Well, maybe the fact that then I understand that, what I've been thinking wrong, or how I've read the text wrong, and, just that there's a word, like, "never" or "always" or something like that, that I've, like, missed, and then, because of that, I've missed something, and then it explains to me that, hey, it says something like this and that's why it can't be right.

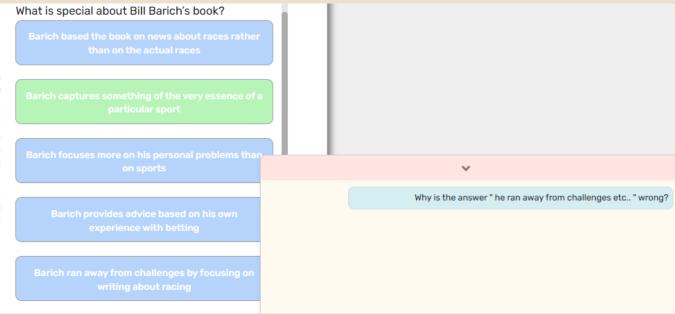

Sports Books

Laughing in the Hills by Bill Barich (1980)

As mid-life crises go, Barich's, aged 35, is special. Five rejected novels, mother and mother-in-law dead of cancer five weeks apart, no money, no job, wife with suspected brain tumour. Craving structure, he found it only studying the Daily Racing Form, picking horses methodically and placing small bets. He then told his wife (tumour: false alarm), he'd be moving to a motel next to San Francisco's Golden Gate Fields racetrack, "convinced there was something special about racing and I wanted to get to the heart of the matter." There was. He did. His write-up of that time is spectacularly good.

Student's query Chatbot's response

Why is the answer "he ran away from challenges etc.. " wrong?

The answer "Barich ran away from challenges by focusing on writing about racing" is incorrect because the text does not suggest that Barich was running away from his challenges. Instead, it shows that during a difficult time in his life, he found structure and a special interest in racing. He moved to a motel next to a racetrack and studied racing methodically, which suggests a deep engagement with the sport rather than an escape from his personal problems. Therefore, the correct answer is "Barich captures something of the very essence of a particular sport" because he immersed himself in the world of racing and was able to write about it in a way that captured its essence.

- There is potential for learner interactions with the chatbot, focusing on the task at hand, to complement standardised mediation (focusing on developing learners' L2 English reading ability)
- Studying longitudinally potential changes in learner engagement with chatbot - whether there can be a shift from text-specific queries to those focusing on reading development
- Learner performance with mediation + chatbot discussions as basis for classroom interventions
 - What changing learner queries beyond the task at hand can allow for
